Notes from President-Elect, Dr. Jacob Womack

The 2014 WVMTA Convention will be held from November 13-15, 2014 at Fairmont State University in Fairmont, WV. The Friday evening concert and piano competitions will take place in Colebank Hall. All other events will take place in Wallman Hall.

The convention will begin Thursday evening, November 13 at 5:00 p.m., with the District Chairs and Board Meeting at Poky Dot. Poky Dot is a 50's style café that features burgers and shakes. The restaurant is located at 1111 Fairmont Ave. (along US route 250).

Fairmont State University Music Faculty will present a concert in Wallman Hall Theatre at 8:00 p.m.

Friday morning will open with Dr. Sandra Schwartz presenting "Vocal Health: Maintaining a Healthy Teaching Voice," in Room 236.

At 10:15 a.m., Dr. Laura Williamson will present the workshop ""Helping Your Students Get out of Five-Finger Land Before It's Too Late," in Room 236. Following Dr. Williamson's session, it will be lunch on your own. The most convenient option for lunch is the Falcon Center Cafeteria located on the Fairmont State campus. The cafeteria serves hot meals, sandwiches, and salads.

The afternoon sessions begin at 1:00 p.m. with conference clinician, Dr. Anita Renfroe, presenting "It's not what it seems," in room 236. At 2:15 p.m., Dr. Williamson will present the seminar "Developing Good Music Reading Skills in Students of All Ages," in room 236. The final session of the day will be at 3:30 p.m. in room 236 where Roland USA educator, Ellen Gonzales, will present "Teaching Piano in the Digital Age."

The general membership meeting will be held Friday at 5:00 p.m. in room 229.

The WVMTA Banquet will be held on Friday, November 14, at 6:00 p.m. at Muriale's Restaurant, 1742 Fairmont Ave. (along US route 250). Muriale's is a staple of northern West Virginia featuring southern Italian cuisine. A private table has been reserved for up to 20 people. Attendees will order from their menu, most meals run \$15 - \$30. No advanced payment is required, but an RSVP is requested.

The day concludes with acclaimed pianist, Dr. Henry Wong Doe, in concert in Colebank Hall at 8:00 p.m.

On Saturday, November 15, competitions will begin at 8:00 a.m. at various sites in Wallman Hall and Colebank Hall. Competition winners will be announced at the hospitality/registration table around 30 minutes after the last participant performs. There will be no winner's recital at this year's convention.

Guest Artists and Clinicians:

Conference Artist: Dr. Henry Wong Doe



A native of New Zealand, Henry Wong Doe received his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Piano from The Juilliard School in New York, as well as a Master's degree from Indiana University Bloomington. Prior to his studies in the United States, Henry received his undergraduate degree from the University of Auckland, as well as a performer's Licentiate from the Trinity College of London. Henry is currently Assistant Professor of Piano at Indiana University Pennsylvania, teaching both applied and class piano.

Henry has been a prizewinner of several international piano competitions, including the Sydney (2000), Rubinstein (Tel Aviv, Israel 2001), Busoni (Bolzano, Italy 2002), and World (Cincinnati, 2007). He has performed in major concert halls around the world including Lincoln Center, New York, Heinz Hall, Pittsburgh, Mann Auditorium, Tel Aviv and the Sydney Opera House. In November 2008, he made his debut at Carnegie Weill Recital Hall, performing solo and interactive works for piano and computer-controlled piano. This recital was the culmination of his research for his doctoral dissertation "Musician or Machine: the Influence of the Player-Piano and Composers of the Twentieth Century."

Henry's debut album, *Horizon*, of piano works by New Zealand composer, Gareth Farr, was released in August 2012 on the Trust Records label (MMT 2070), and was featured on New York's WNYC radio "New Sounds" program. This recording was also released in digital download format on iTunes, Amazon and InstantEncore.

An avid collaborator as well as solo musician, Henry works closely with violinist Eugenia Choi, Assistant Professor of Violin at the University of British Columbia. Together they were prize winners at the 2004 Swedish International Duo Competition. Henry also enjoys working with dancers, having collaborated twice with the acclaimed Complexions Contemporary Ballet company at the Joyce Theater in New York City. Henry has performed with the Pittsburgh Symphony, Israel Philharmonic, Sydney Symphony, Australian Chamber and Auckland Philharmonia Orchestras, and worked with conductors Christopher Hogwood, Michael Christie, Edvard Tchivzel and Marko Letonja. His prizewinning performances at the 2000 Sydney International Piano Competition were recorded and released on ABC Classics.

In addition to the piano, Henry studied French Horn during his undergraduate studies in New Zealand and was a member of the New Zealand National Youth Orchestra.

Featured Conference Clinician: Dr. Laura Williamson



Laura Williamson, DMA, NCTM, is an active pianist and teacher who enjoys working with students of all ages and abilities. She has held faculty positions at colleges and universities in South Carolina, Ohio, North Carolina, Michigan and Pennsylvania. A specialist in piano teacher training and mentoring, while she was Director of Keyboard Pedagogy at Capital University she founded Beginning Piano for Children in Capital's Community Music School. This program offered group and private lessons to neighborhood children while providing supervised student teaching experiences for undergraduate piano majors.

Nationally recognized as a progressive piano educator, Laura is in frequent demand as a consultant, adjudicator, guest speaker, and mentor. She has given presentations at national conferences throughout the United States, including the MTNA National Conference, World Piano Pedagogy Conference, the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, GP3 the National Group Piano and Piano Pedagogy Forum, as well as numerous state and local events. Laura's research and performing interests are diverse, ranging from the role of the Internet in piano instruction, to the teaching of technique and sight-reading, to the piano music of J.S. Bach and Johannes Brahms.

As a pedagogical author and editor, Laura has had articles and reviews published in **Piano and Keyboard, Keyboard Companion, American Music Teacher,** and the on-line journal **Piano Pedagogy Forum**. She is an editorial consultant to The Frederick Harris Music Company, and in that capacity was involved in the development of major publications such as **The Celebration Series**, **The Composer Library**, **Exploring Music History**, and **Sound Advice Theory and Ear Training**, for which she served as series editor.

A nationally certified member of Music Teachers National Association, Laura holds degrees from the Royal Conservatory of Music, the University of Western Ontario, Southern Methodist University, and the University of Oklahoma. Her former teachers include the internationally respected pedagogical authors and editors E.L. Lancaster and Jane Magrath, and Dr. Peter Simon, currently President of the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto.

Since relocating to Pennsylvania in 2010, Laura has become a visible member of her musical community. In Johnstown she sings with the Johnstown Symphony Chorus, and she has performed several times on the First Lutheran "Music at Noon" series as a solo and

collaborative pianist. She has judged the Pennsylvania State MTNA Piano Competitions, and she has been engaged as a clinician for several member affiliates of the Pennsylvania Music Teachers Association. Laura is currently a part-time member of the music faculty at University of Pittsburgh-Johnstown, where she teaches applied piano and music history. She also maintains a professional teaching studio from her home in Johnstown, where she lives with her husband David and daughters Rebecca and Jessica.

Conference Clinician: Dr. Anita Renfroe



Anita Boyle Renfroe, Professor of Music & Director of Keyboard Studies at Millersville University, earned her degrees in piano performance-the Bachelor of Music from Florida State University, the Master of Music from Memphis State University, and the Doctor of Musical Arts from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary School of Music in Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Renfroe's key teachers and mentors include Webster Teague, Leonard Mastrogiacomo, Edward Kilenyi, Daniel Fletcher, Carolyn Fruchtman, Maurice Hinson, and Nelita True.

Piano and harpsichord performances take Dr. Renfroe throughout the United States and Europe. Concert venues

in Europe include performances in Heidelberg, Frankfort, and Stuttgart, Germany as well as Grenoble and Nohant, France. Renfroe's solos recitals in Washington D.C., include the Kennedy Center Terrace Theater, Wolf Trap Center for the Performing Arts, the Organization of American States, the National Air and Space Museum, the World Bank, the British Embassy, the Folger Library, as piano soloist with the Fairfax Chamber Orchestra and as organ soloist with the Arlington Symphony Orchestra. Recent performances in the Mid-Atlantic region include harpsichord and piano concerts in Williamsburg, VA, Bethlehem, PA, and throughout central Pennsylvania.

Dr. Renfroe is a featured artist, clinician, and adjudicator for state and national conventions, including the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) and the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy. She has been awarded permanent Professional and Master Teacher certificates from the Music Teachers National Association and is a member of the Pi Kappa Lambda and Alpha Lambda Delta Music Honor Societies. Grants and awards during her tenure at Millersville University include a Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education grant for research on Mendelssohn at Oxford University's Bodleian Library, and a sabbatical to research the French composer, Eugene Nollet. Her current research is focused on the study and performance of music composed for the fortepiano.

Conference Clinician: Ellen Gonzales:



Ellen Gonzales is currently the Market Development Manager of Music Education for the Roland Corporation U.S. Ellen earned a degree in Music Education with a minor in Music Business from the Crane School of Music in Potsdam, N Y

With a varied background of teaching experiences ranging from public school to private institutions, Ellen has presented numerous clinics and workshops that offer a range of solutions for educators of both individual and group lesson

programs. An advocate for Recreation Music Making, Ellen is also a sought-after trainer and mentor in the RMM movement.

Conference Clinician: Dr. Sandra Schwartz



Sandra Schwartz, Associate Professor of Music, joined the WVU faculty in 2006. She earned her Ph.D. in Music Education from the University of Miami after a successful career as a high school choral director in the School District of Lee County (FL). Prior to teaching public school, she earned her M.M. in Choral Conducting and B.M. in Music Education, also from the University of Miami.

At WVU, Dr. Schwartz teaches choral music methods and materials, voice class, vocal pedagogy, introduction to music education, foundations of music education, psychology of music, advanced choral methods, and research methods. She also supervises student teachers and the student-directed ensemble

Mountaineer Chorale. Her research and presentation interests include vocal health of choral directors, maintaining a healthy teaching voice, and the use of technology in music methods courses. Dr. Schwartz has presented papers and workshops at many conferences, including Florida Music Educator's Association, Southern Division MENC, National MENC, Society for Music Teacher Education (SMTE), College Music Society, and Australian Society for Music Education. Her research has been published in the Journal of Research in Music Education.

Dr. Schwartz is a member of MENC: The National Association for Music Education, American Choral Directors Association (ACDA), National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS), College Music Society (CMS), Sigma Alpha Iota, and Pi Kappa Lambda.



Notes from WVMTA Membership Chair, Ruth Carson, NCTM

As of September 23, 2014, the total number of WVMTA members is 83, of which 14 are student members.

Recruitment Methods

How Do We Recruit Members?

There are things you can do to actively recruit new members, and there are things you can do to make your association more visible in the hope that music teachers in your area will find out about you and want to join. The following guidelines from MTNA: http://www.mtna.org/media/32321/HANDBOOK%20Recruitment%20Methods.pdf are terrific ideas for proactive recruiting.

A small selection from these guidelines includes:

Recruitment Methods

There are several methods you can use to proactively recruit new members.

- Use word of mouth.
- Distribute brochures through music stores and instrument dealers.
- Give brochures to libraries, real estate agents, Chambers of Commerce and the like for further distribution
- Do a direct mail or e-mail campaign to names on your prospect list and names you can obtain from other sources.
- Contact local college and university music departments.

In addition, you can do some publicity to increase the visibility of your group, and prospective members will come to you: •

- Place an article in a local newspaper or city magazine about your group, a prominent member or remarkable student.
- Send press releases to local newspapers, radio and TV stations to announce member and student news and promote MTA events.
- Make yourself available to local newspapers as an expert and source for information on music-related topics—the more you get quoted, the better for your association.
- Offer to speak to civic groups, PTAs, church groups and other audiences about topics such as the benefits of music study to developing children or senior citizens.

Findings from the American Society of Association Executives show at least 33 percent of nonmembers had not joined their representative professional association because they had never heard of the group. There are probably music teachers in your area who have never heard of MTNA. The more exposure you can get for your members and your group's activities, the better.

Recruitment Tips From Our Members

Don't forget non-pianists.

Encourage collaborative events.

Seek out young teachers. Provide childcare.

Pay part or all of dues for a first-time member (active, or collegiate in nearby collegiate chapter). One state allocated money for this purpose for a specified period of time. Use testimonials about the value of MTNA (websites, brochures, meetings and activities where prospects are invited).

Spring social—bring guests. Have outline of next year's meetings and activities. Get-acquainted fall social—bring guests. Have ice-breaker, then committee chairs describe their function and plans for the year.

Use the Internet: Facebook, Youtube, online forums.

Travel grants for collegiate chapters: Local/state association pay conference registration or hotel for state conference/national conference.

Be aware of the many benefits of MTNA as you recruit:

- •American Music Teacher

- •Education opportunities at local, state, national level
- Networking
- Performance/competitions
- Professional certification
- Online resources
- •Incentive programs for the "everyday" student
- •Insurance and Financial Services
- Grant Opportunities
- Empowerment

Be welcoming to prospective or new members, not intimidating.

New member lunch: every member bring a prospective member.

Hold teachers' recitals and invite local teachers and families not involved in MTNA.

Hold a monthly "musicale" that includes the performance of solos and duets as well as sight reading new materials and talking about teaching issues—invite non-member teachers.

Offer a package that will appeal to local teachers, such as discounts on books.

Hold workshops open to all teachers, not just members.

Have state college chair develop list of college teachers (including nonmembers) who would be willing and able to give presentations at local meetings, etc.

Partner with other organizations.

Ask college faculty members for names of colleagues who would benefit from MTNA membership—or have them work on recruitment.

Encourage "member get a member," every member invite a non-member to a meeting or activity. In addition to flyers, use striking posters.

Keep Recruiting

Seeking new members is a continuous process. You should always be thinking of available opportunities to attract new members.

Carole Kriewaldt (Carole Ann Holmes)

I believe the number one prerequisite for any teacher is very simple... you must love children! When you love a child, you are always honest with them. They really believe you when you say something has been done well or something really needs a lot of work. I start teaching children as early as 3 1/2 years old. Usually I keep them through the seventh or eighth grade. After six to eight years of study with a teacher, I feel they have been given the best that teacher has to offer, and it is time to send them on. It is important for their musical growth that they receive new and different ideas.

Technique is a must and I start it on the very first lesson, no matter what the age. One thing I have learned is that children will rise to whatever expectations you establish for them. Their willingness to trust is absolutely adorable and that should never be abused. Children are just amazing and we can learn as much from them as they can from us. When they walk in my door for a lesson, technique is first at all times. No technique - no lesson!! I also realize that this approach is not for every child, so I interview the parents of the child to make sure they understand what I expect. I personally do not use method books except for maybe the first six months. Once they know their notes and how to count, we go straight into simple repertoire. I do not believe in the "hand position" approach -- there are 88 keys and ten fingers. Technique will get you up and down the piano, not five -finger hand positions.

I can say with all honesty, that I have not always been a good teacher. As a matter of fact, it would be safe to say, that I was a disaster!! However, I was determined to learn and grow. So over the years I managed to develop a program that brought the best out in my students, and consequently they have brought the best out in me.

Sometimes you really cannot tell whether you are making an impact on a child or not. It is not until years later when you view their accomplishments, or when you hear from them and they thank you for establishing the self discipline necessary to learn in any field. It is at that point you become aware of the fact that you have had major influence on someone's life. Over the years I have seen many students go on to become amazing leaders in their field and they all dearly love and appreciate music. That is what it is all about.

During the past 33 years I have had the honor to be the teacher of students that have won prizes in Texas, Wisconsin, Maryland, Virginia, Washington DC, and West Virginia. They have been winners of local, state, national and international competitions. They have given recitals in their hometowns, statewide public events, national stages such as Carniegie Hall and in foreign countries. Many of them have gone on to be music majors in conservatories and universities. I am always honored to say that I played a small part in each child's life.

Morgantown will be offering national MDP Examinations this Fall. Performance exams will be held on Saturday December 6 at the Creative Arts Center. Written Theory Exams will be offered on Friday & Saturday, December 12 & 13, location TBD.

The Royal Conservatory MDP is a comprehensive program (theory, technic, ear training, sight reading, studies, repertoire) that assesses and certifies student progress (for most all instruments) according to national standards. Trained examiners are sent to sites to evaluate student presentations. National headquarters has now opened the registration process, effective September 5, for Fall exams. The LAST date to register will be in early October. All registration is done online by students/parents. There is very little that individual teachers are required to do except to continue the preparation that has hopefully already been in process anyway! And Teachers: there is no additional membership required, to any organizations, although you can register yourself through MDP (for free) to obtain a teacher-number and get access to results of students who register under you.

You can access the online national exams site by googling music development program, or Royal Conservatory Music Development Program, or to get directly to the site: musicdevelopmentprogram.org

When students/parents register for the first time, they will need to create a log-in user-name/email & password. Remember this info for easy access for future exams.

Each registrant will also need to have available: the teacher's permanent number (if applicable), or teacher phone number or teacher email address.

Once registration is completed, each student then gets a permanent, forever, "student number". Either remind each student/parent to remember this number for easy access for future exams, or copy this number down in teacher files for future retrieval. The registration process itself is relatively easy...just a series of drop-down menu choices mostly.

Eligibility:

All students who study with a member of WVMTA are eligible to enter. Junior I runs through 6^{th} grade & Junior II runs through 8^{th} grade; Intermediate through 10^{th} grade and Senior through the college level.

Audition Procedure:

Selections must be memorized. Contestants must provide a score in the correct edition for the judges. One original copy of the music is sufficient. Evaluation areas: Interpretation and overall artistic effect. A winner in each category/movement will be selected solely on the basis of the audition performance. The decision of the judges is final. Students must secure their own accompanist for the competition; however, performance of the required repertoire with a second pianist is optional.

WVMTA member, Dr Christine Bane Kefferstan, NCTM passed away on Wednesday morning August 20, 2014. She died comfortably and peacefully in her home, surrounded by her family (husband Robert and children Sean and Mary). Christine died after a recurrence of the cancer that initially plagued her 9 months ago. Since 1979, Kefferstan was Professor of Piano at West Virginia University, Morgantown, where she taught graduate and undergraduate piano majors. Dr. Kefferstan's articles have appeared in Keyboard Companion, Clavier, and Piano Quarterly. An active member of Music Teachers National Association since 1982, Kefferstan had served as WV State President, MTNA Eastern Division President, and member of both the MTNA National Foundation Board and the MTNA Board of Directors. Christine was President of WVMTA from 1989-1991, and named WVMTA's "Teacher of

the Year" both in 1992 and again in 2013.

A celebration of Christine's life took place on Sunday, September 21st, at St. Mary Roman Catholic Church. Our thoughts and prayers are extended to her husband, Bob, and her children.
