The 2015 WVMTA Convention continues to come together. The theme for 2015 Convention is "Music and Wellness."

Dr. Christian Guzman will serve as the Convention artist and will assist with adjudication. Guzman is a multiple prizewinner in many international competitions, including the Walter M. Naumburg Competition, the Seoul International Music Competition, the Isang Yun Competition and the *Concours International de Piano d'Orleans of Orleans*. A master class is also under consideration.

Jacqueline Herbein, NCTM will be the featured Convention clinician. She is known for creative approach in unraveling technical problems at the piano. Ms. Herbein has an extensive background in the physiology of piano technique; having studied with such leaders in the field as pianists Dena Golandsky and Barbara Lister-Sink. Her articles have been published in *The American Music Teacher, The Canadian Music Teacher, Clavier* and *Clavier Companion* magazines.

Dr. Johan Botes of Marshall University will also be presenting at the 2015 Convention. Furthermore, discussion is underway with the Marshall University Music and Wellness program as a potential participant in the 2015 Convention.

The convention hotel will be announced in the next newsletter. The banquet will be held on Oct. 24th on the campus of Marshall University.

Royal Conservatory Music Development Program

Morgantown & Shepherdstown will both be offering national RCM-MDP Examinations this Spring.

Performance exams in Morgantown will be held on Saturday & Sunday May 30 & 31, at the Creative Arts Center of West Virginia University. Written Theory Exams at both West Virginia sites will be offered on Friday & Saturday, May 8 & 9. The RCM Practical Examinations will be held Tuesday, May 14 at Shepherd University.

The Royal Conservatory MDP is a comprehensive program (theory, technique, ear training, sight reading, studies, repertoire) that assesses and certifies student progress (for most all instruments) according to national standards. Trained examiners are sent to sites to evaluate

student presentations. National headquarters has now opened the registration process for Spring exams. The LAST date to register without a late fee will be February 17. All registration is done online by students/parents. There is very little that individual teachers are required to do except to continue the preparation that has hopefully already been in process anyway! And Teachers: there is no additional membership required, to any organizations, although you can register yourself through MDP (for free) to obtain a teacher-number and get access to results of students who register under you.

You can access the online national exams site by googling music development program, or Royal Conservatory Music Development Program, or to get directly to the site: musicdevelopmentprogram.org

When students/parents register for the first time, they will need to create a log-in user-name/email & password. Remember this info for easy access for future exams.

Each registrant will also need to have available: the teacher's permanent number (if applicable), or teacher phone number or teacher email address.

Once registration is completed, each student then gets a permanent, forever, "student number". Either remind each student/parent to remember this number for easy access for future exams, or copy this number down in teacher files for future retrieval. The registration process itself is relatively easy...just a series of drop-down menu choices mostly.



Remind members of the many benefits they receive through membership:


